


You Can Do It Too!

Four simple steps to blogging about anything, even programming



Step 1 Get a Blog!


- You don't need your own site
- Sign up on Dev.to, DZone, Medium, others...
- Spend more time writing, less time fiddling with software



Medium is a place

Or... Build Your Own Blog!

- More customization options, but more time-consuming
- WordPress.com
 - Hosted, but lets you change some things
- GitHub Pages
 - Uses git, needs static site generator software
- Your preferred web host

More About Using a Web Host An Investment in Your Career

- Centralized platforms come and go. Don't lose your audience!
 - Remember Geocities? MySpace? Orkut?
 - Can also deplatform you...
 - YouTube accidentally did this twice this week to this conference!
- Choose & register a domain—this becomes part of your brand
- Get a dedicated server, cloud container, or at least a VPS
 - Other sites on a shared host can knock you offline

Step 2 Write!

- This doesn't have to be hard
- What are you working on?
 What are you learning?
- Favorite library? Feature?
- Find programming challenges on the web, write about your solutions
- You have a unique perspective!



Types of Blog Posts

(taken from DZone)

- News
- Tutorial
- Opinion
- Analysis
- Survey or contest

- Review
- Presentation
- Code snippet
- Interview



Always Include These for successful blog posts

- Catchy title for attention
 - Clickbait-y but honest
 - Bruno can help!
- Topical picture
 - Give credit if necessary
 - Creative Commons and Wikimedia
 Commons are good sources, include
 license & attribution info
- Post length doesn't matter
 - One or two paragraphs is OK if it's all you can manage



Step 3 Promote!

- No one will find you otherwise
 - Go where the readers are
- Social networks & forums
- Language & topic-specific groups, but outside too
- #Hashtag social media posts:
 #Java, #programming, #webdev
- Automate with plugins and services like IFTTT, Zapier


Link anywhere and everywhere!

- Personal Twitter, Facebook,
 LinkedIn
- Language-specific Facebook,
 LinkedIn, Reddit groups
- LinkedIn groups for FOSS (Free and Open Source Software)
 Professionals
- Hacker News

- Reddit groups (automated with Zapier)
 - r/coding
 - r/programming
 - r/webdev
 - r/perl
- Email automatically sent to subscribers by WordPress

Cross-Posting Have Lots of Blogs!

- Import to Dev.to, DZone, Medium from feeds or web pages
- Take time to fix formatting, especially source code


Step 4 Repeat!

- Consistency builds reader trust
- Make time to write and publish regularly
 - At least monthly
 - Weekly or more is better, but find a schedule that fits
- Find new topics in comments and social media responses even negative ones!



What I've Learned

- Keep a to-do list on my phone as a backlog for ideas wherever I go
- Write on the weekends, schedule posts for the week
- Get topics from work but omit proprietary details
 - Write generic example code, upload to GitHub
- Blogging has increased my expertise at work
 - Colleagues come to me for advice—management notices
- Invited to speak at user groups and conferences
